A Note of Thanks from RAM Executive Director and Curator of Collections Bruce W. Pepich Thank you for your support of Racine Art Museum through your gifts in 2015! Your contributions serve the people of this community, the region, and the national fine art and craft field by supporting RAM's mission to serve artists and public education. RAM is a center for positive creativity and lifelong learning, open to people of all ages from all walks of life. RAM is also grateful to the volunteers who donated thousands of hours of their time to make our extensive programs and educational offerings possible. The museum is here because of you, and we are here for you!

After celebrating a 20% increase in guests in 2014, making it the museum's largest attendance in its history, I am pleased to tell you that we have built upon those numbers and added another 7% more visitors in 2015. This now makes the 2015 guest count of 64,198 the largest in the museum's history and our **second record-setting year** in a row. Attendance for all programs at both RAM and Wustum is up as is participation in many of our offsite education programs. While RAM has always been proud of the number of people from outside Racine County who visit—and the contribution of \$5-\$6 million they make to our local economy each year—we were very pleased to see that much of the increase for 2015 was in local guests coming to their hometown museum.

As we prepare to inaugurate our year-long celebration of the 75th anniversary of RAM's Charles A. Wustum Museum of Fine Arts later this fall, we look back frequently on the museum's history in the community and the field as well as the journey that has brought us here. This museum has benefitted greatly from the involvement of hundreds of qualified women for nearly eight decades. Through their hard work, bright ideas, dedication, and generosity, women have been particularly influential in making this museum what it is today. We have just said good-bye to one of our most important women in our history—Karen Johnson Boyd, who died at the end of January. Through generous philanthropy and a dedication to sharing artwork she loved with the public, this woman has had an effect on the institution that is as important as Jennie E. Wustum's decision to turn her home into an art museum. Mrs. Boyd's gifts, beginning in the 1970s, have placed the museum—and this community—on the nation's culture map with the opening of RAM in 2003. She will be greatly missed and is featured in this issue as we say good-bye to a dear and true friend. Please watch for a series of programs we will roll out over the next two years to celebrate Mrs. Boyd's life in art.

More than 75 years ago, Jennie Wustum left a legacy to our community to develop and support a fine art museum in honor of her husband. Charles. Collectively, you have sustained and built upon her legacy. You became a member, volunteered your time, honored a loved one, donated goods, or gave an annual gift to carry on RAM's mission. And for this, we thank each and every one of you listed in this report. Simply put, if it weren't for you, RAM wouldn't exist.



There are many ways to support RAM and Wustum through present and future gifts gifts that can cement your legacy and sustain our exhibitions and programs well into the future for our children, grandchildren, and tens of thousands of visitors each year. Consider giving RAM a planned gift.

What is a planned gift?

A planned gift is given during your lifetime or as part of your estate. It may be in the form of a bequest, cash, real estate, an annuity, life insurance, or a retirement account that names RAM as a full, partial, or residual beneficiary.

Does a planned gift have to meet a minimum dollar amount?

No. Gifts in ANY amount are welcome and essential to sustaining our future.

When making a bequest in our will, do we have to specify a dollar amount?

No. You have several choices: a specific dollar amount, a percent of your estate, or what is left in your estate after other bequests are fulfilled.

Are retirement policies a good planned gift?

Yes, they can be. Your pre-tax IRA or 401-K, or a portion thereof, can pass to RAM without any taxation, whereas it would be taxed if left to a family member or friend.

What happens if, in a few years, I want to change my plans regarding future gifts

Many planned gifts can be adjusted as needed. Often, a gift amount may increase because of favorable economic conditions, changes in the family, or memorial opportunities. Adverse conditions may also necessitate changes.

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Where can you see a necklace made of polymer and crayon, a tapestry emblazoned with an image of a palm tree, a 3D printed ring, and a cuckoo clock made of woven strips of paper? These, and almost 200 more works, are at RAM this spring. The current exhibitions, primarily drawn from RAM's collection, emphasize a



variety of approaches to unexpected materials and subject matter.

Spectrum: Contemporary Artists in Color includes artworks made primarily of polymer, ceramics, and glass. The artists featured in this exhibition explore color as a formal element and as a concept that can be symbolic or metaphorical. Playing off the wave of color that starts with Spectrum, California Dreamin' features the work of Mark Adams and Frank Lobdell—two artists who lived in California and who shared a desire to explore how pattern and color develop a composition. The bold and dynamic spirit of Adams and Lobdell carries through to the jewelry in Paper/Plastic: Contemporary Adornment. This jewelry reflects the experimental and playful side of contemporary artists interested in investigating new materials and new roles for jewelry. Similarly, the artists featured in Cut, Fold, and Form experiment with materials as they transform paper—familiar and seemingly mundane—into vessels, sculpture, adornment, and artist's books. Featured artists Kiff Slemmons, who makes ornate paper jewelry, and Julie VonDerVellen, who creates complex sculptural paper watches and clocks, are represented by multiple works.

This summer RAM goes "glam" with exhibitions featuring artists who explore the decorative and excessive as well as things that gleam and shine.

Drawing on the historical term baroque, which has generally described works that were theatrical and "over the top," *Go for Baroque* features artists that comment on luxury, artificiality, consumption, ornament, and the line between the beautiful and the grotesque. Whether a wall installation composed of silver

reflective woven strips of paper, polymer works that look like banquet centerpieces, or extravagant, colorful jewelry, these artists investigate contemporary cultural, social, and historical ideas. Primarily comprised of work borrowed from artists across the country working in a wide range of media, this exhibition also includes examples from RAM's ever-growing permanent collection.

A companion exhibition, *Precious Metals*, explores our innate fascination with things that glisten and plays with notions of preciousness and material value. Mainly comprised of artworks made of precious metals, the show also features shiny objects made of other materials and other metals. This comparison is meant to draw attention to reasons why artists choose certain media. Drawn entirely from RAM's holdings, this exhibition offers a framework for looking at works that are visually compelling and thought-provoking.

Celebrating Karen Johnson Boyd

1924 - 2016

RAM experienced the end of an era with the death of long-time friend and benefactor Karen Johnson Boyd on January 29. Throughout her life, Mrs. Boyd has been an advocate for visual artists and arts institutions across the country. She is especially remembered as a major figure in the contemporary craft field, assembling one of the country's most respected collections of this material. She will be remembered as an enthusiastic supporter of living contemporary artists through acquisitions and the public exhibition of their work. She donated artworks to numerous museum collections across the country but was especially devoted to RAM, presenting first the Wustum Museum of Fine Arts and then RAM with more than 1,750 works of art in all media since the 1970s. Many of these works can be seen regularly in the museum's ongoing exhibitions.



Born in 1924, Karen Boyd was a lifelong resident of Racine where her family established SC Johnson. She was a teenager in the late 1930s, when her father, H.F. Johnson Jr., commissioned Frank Lloyd Wright to design the company's world-famous Administration Building and a home, Wingspread, in which her family lived. Later, as a young married woman with four children, she commissioned her own home designed by Wright. It was completed in 1954. She lived in this residence in Racine throughout her life.

By the time she reached high school, Mrs. Boyd was taking art history and studio art classes. She was particularly influenced by her maternal grandfather, Olaf Brauner, a post-Impressionist painter and head of the Art Department at Cornell University. Mrs. Boyd studied at Bennington College in Vermont. She began collecting by acquiring works from faculty members at Bennington but became more active in this endeavor after her exposure to two collections of art the Johnson Company assembled—Art USA Now (1962) and Objects: USA (1969). The first exhibition was devoted to paintings and contained works by contemporary artists, such as Richard Diebenkorn, Joan Mitchell, and Robert Rauschenberg, and toured internationally. The second was devoted to contemporary craft and marked the first time many encyclopedic American art museums presented one-of-a-kind works by artists such as Wendell Castle, Lenore Tawney, and Harvey Littleton in their galleries. Based on this exposure, Mrs. Boyd began to actively assemble a wide-ranging collection of work by young artists working in craft media, works on paper, and photography. She boldly and confidently presented these side-by-side in her home and was one of the first major Wisconsin art collectors to plunge into ceramics, baskets, and blown glass in a big way.

She saw no hierarchical differences between the art media she championed—viewing craft media as having the same aesthetic value as painting and sculpture. She would present these richly textured materials in thoughtful combinations throughout her home in ways that would not only inspire other collectors but also encourage artists to see their own work differently.

After collecting privately for a period of time, Mrs. Boyd became involved in projects in a broader public forum. In the late 1970s, she curated a collection for **SC Johnson's Council House**, a conference and residence facility in Racine with **Lee Nordness**, the lead curator for both Johnson collections. For two years, they travelled to 49 countries to locate work that would represent the cultures where the Company did business,

Still on view today, this collection is a stimulating blend of different types of artworks, presented in a way that encourages the sharing of ideas.

At the beginning of the 1980s, she founded Perimeter Press which published print portfolios by Frances Myers and Keiko Hara and a monograph on the Ohio-based ceramic sculptor, Jack Earl. In 1982, she opened Perimeter Gallery in Chicago's River North neighborhood. The Gallery's aesthetic closely aligned with her own, presenting major figures in the painting and craft fields side-by-side and combining recognized masters with emerging talent. Over the years the Gallery has represented painters and sculptors including Anthony Caro, Warrington Colescott, Dorothy Dehner, Robert Kushner, and



David Shapiro, along with major figures in the craft field such as Lia Cook, Sheila Hicks, John Mason, Toshiko Takaezu, and Peter Voulkos. Mrs. Boyd was actively involved with the Gallery, curating two exhibitions—the *Nude in Clay*, 1995 and the *Nude in Clay* II, 1998. These included works from across the fine arts field by artists such as Robert Arneson, Ruth Duckworth, Mary Frank, and Elie Nadelman.

Although she had been donating artwork to the museum since the mid-1970s, Mrs. Boyd presented RAM with a major gift of 200 artworks in 1991 that immediately established a nationally significant contemporary craft collection here. The national attention Mrs. Boyd's 1991 gift attracted drew many collectors from across the country to the museum and in the following years, RAM amassed the largest contemporary craft collection in any US art museum. When we opened our new facility in downtown Racine in 2003, we recognized Mrs. Boyd's support of our collection and exhibition programs over the years, by dedicating the museum's exhibition galleries in her honor. The collection has grown over 300% in the past 13 years to about 9,000 works thanks to people following her example however, Karen Boyd herself has presented the largest number of artworks to RAM in what has been a long and rewarding relationship.

Mrs. Boyd was actively involved in the efforts to build RAM, taking part in fundraising efforts and making major contributions to the campaign. She also established endowment funds to support collections care and exhibitions. Although she was an avid supporter of craft, she also collected graphics and post-World War II photography. Mrs. Boyd has significantly added to RAM's works on paper collection—especially through the contribution of over 150 photographs in recent years that included works by Bill Brandt, Harry Callahan, Lee Friedlander, Duane Michals, Irving Penn, and Aaron Siskind.

Over the past 40 years, Mrs. Boyd served actively on the boards and acquisition committees of a number of major museums. She amassed art not for its own sake but to share it with others to promote the making of good art. Her support of the visual arts field has been publicly recognized numerous times with the receipt of: Wisconsin Governor's Award in Support of the Arts, 1986; Award of Distinction from the American Craft Council, 1992; Lifetime Achievement Award from the American Craft Museum, New York City, 1996; Friends of Contemporary Ceramics Lifetime Achievement Award, 2004; and the Wisconsin Visual Art Lifetime



Achievement Award, 2012. In 2002, she was featured in *Art & Antiques* magazine's annual *100 Top Collectors* and in an extended article in *American Craft* magazine, in 2009, featuring her collection and her home. In 2003, she was made a Fellow of the Wisconsin Academy of Sciences, Arts and Letters. After serving on RAM's Board for 13 consecutive years, she was awarded Emerita status in 2012, only the second honor of this type presented by RAM in its 75-year history.

Mrs. Boyd's generosity of spirit, her enthusiasm for this field, and her commitment to thoughtful financial support are things we honor today and for which we are very grateful. You can come to RAM any day of the year and find works donated by Karen Boyd on display. Today is no different. This quick-to-laugh woman once said, "I am saddened by people who avoid art as something to be leery of. There's an artist for every person." All who visit RAM benefit in some way from the support and encouragement of artists Mrs. Boyd provided. And an art museum in Racine, Wisconsin took on a greater national and international role all because of the collection she built in her hometown and that she gave to a community she loved. We will miss this extraordinary woman very much.

RAM: Making Racine a Better Place with Each Visit

While seeing cultural groups as the recipients of philanthropy is fairly commonplace, it is also important to think of these institutions as economic generators, spending the funds they raise to purchase goods, services, and contributing to the financial wellbeing of the communities they serve.

Imagine you're going to a Racine Theatre Guild production, a Racine Symphony concert, or an event at the Racine Art Museum. You may hire a babysitter, go to dinner beforehand, or have cocktails afterwards with friends. You might purchase a new outfit or buy gasoline on the way. These actions each support the local economy and many of these purchases might not have happened had you not planned to attend.

RAM was built as both a cultural development and an economic advancement project. The new museum was designed to establish a cultural center in the heart of this community,



while serving as an anchor to downtown Racine's shopping district, like a big box store in an open-air mall. The goal was to attract people to visit the museum and then send them out to the restaurants and shops in its neighborhood. Even RAM's award-winning Museum Store was intended to add to the retail offerings that invite downtown visits. While serving the needs of the local community, we sought to simultaneously interest cultural tourists from throughout the Chicago-Milwaukee corridor who were interested in the museum's focus on contemporary craft artworks, as RAM has one of the largest collections of this material in any US art museum.

Cultural tourists are the people who travel to visit educational sites—museums, gardens, zoos—to learn. National tourism industry research finds that these travelers spend 20% more than the average tourist. Since RAM opened in 2003, we have hosted over 600,000 people. In 2015, 67% of our guests came from outside Racine County, representing 43 states and 17 foreign countries. Minority population participation in RAM's programs has also grown to 36.2%, demonstrating that the museum's audience is also broadly based.

Real Racine has publicly stated that, based on industry statistics, RAM produces a positive spinoff in the local economy of \$5 million or more each year. The museum continues to increase its efforts to expand its impact on the community and attendance in 2014 and 2015 has risen a total of 27%, making 2015, at 64,198 visitors, the highest year of attendance in the museum's history.

What drives this surge in visits is an internationally recognized collection that has grown more than 300% since RAM opened and an array of innovative education programs designed for people of all ages. These are offered at RAM, its Wustum Museum campus, and numerous locations throughout Racine County year-round. Our exhibitions run the gamut from the International Peeps Competition held each spring, to shows of artworks inspired by Star Wars and superheroes and a room-sized installation in which bugs were pinned to the gallery walls to mimic floral wallpaper designs.

While the recession of 2008 has shaken downtown businesses, and we have fewer shopping and entertainment offerings than in 2003, RAM has continued to serve as an attraction and a core number of downtown businesses have held on. Progress is being made here as well as in other communities in the region whose economies have been similarly impacted. Last year's increase in guests included an upswing in the number of Racine County residents visiting RAM. This means that more local people are experiencing high quality programming while spending their money in Racine and saving travel time. While they enjoy a "cultural staycation," they are also making a positive difference to their own economy with each step in their journey.

RAM Artist Fellowship Recipients 2016-2017

To showcase the diversity and vitality of the Racine/Kenosha visual arts community, the biennial RAM Artist Fellowships provide support for the professional development of the community's artists. Additionally, the fellowship program, sponsored by the Osborne and Scekic Family Foundation, distinguishes the region as a place that values the arts and enhances the area's desirability as a place for artists to work and live.



Selected from 34 applicants, the RAM Artist Fellowship recipients for 2016-2017 represent a diverse range of styles and media. Utilizing paper and sewing techniques, Tim Abel (Kenosha) creates wall works and installations. Martin Antaramian (Kenosha) crafts furniture that incorporates a trompe l'oeil ("fool the eye") aspect. Interested in the contemporary landscape, Kristen Bartel (Racine) creates prints about the environment. And, Lisa Bigalke (Kenosha) produces reductive relief prints and handmade books while operating a bookbinding business.

2015 Education Highlights

Thousands of families were served through RAM's education programs during 2015. These include 40 different studio art classes per semester at RAM's Wustum Museum, Free First Fridays, Downtown Outreach, Summer Art Camps, Kids Day, the annual *PEEPS Art Exhibition*, Party on the Pavement, and Free Fall Family Fun Fest.



For the third time in five years, the National Endowment for the Arts, Washington, DC, awarded RAM a non-competitive grant for "excellence in outreach education." **NEA Chairman Jane Chu** said, "I'm pleased to be able to share the news of this award to the Racine Art Museum. In each community the arts have the power to create new avenues for economic health and physical vibrancy, and for people to feel a sense of pride in their locality. This grant demonstrates this power and affirms that the arts are part of our everyday lives."

Other Education Highlights - by the Numbers

Since launching in May 2011, *RAM on the Road (ROTR)* has served nearly 11,000 students by delivering arts experiences to area schools and other community venues. Outreach programs, like *ROTR*, have aided the increased diversity of program participants. Since 2008, minority participation has increased from 8% to 36%.

RAM on the Road presented 90 programs in 2015, compared to 68 in 2014, reflecting an increase of 32 percent.

Attendance at on-site free family art programs increased nearly 17%.

Enrollees in Wustum's studio art classes increased 6.7%.

She makes bracelets from strips of paper bound with elastic string and forms paper rolls into ladder-like necklace constructions (\$50-\$250).
