We asked Kenosha News readers to get creative with the iconic pastel marshmallow candies.


And you didn't disappoint us.

We even had a history lesson with "We the Peeps" as we watched Peeps write the U.S. Constitution.


Here are the entries:



Her creation — a miniature, Peeps-populated version of Miller Park complete with fans and the Racing Sausages — "was inspired by my love of the Milwaukee Brewers and especially the Racing Sausages." She added that the project required "a lot of glue, scrapbook paper, Peeps and a lot of patience."





"The Peeple's Court" — Tom Geb — a Kenoshan who describes himself as "retired but never still!" — took his Peeps to court (complete with a gag order) in this send-up of TV"s "The People's Court." (He's guilty of bad puns, including "chirpetrator.")

"This is a reminder of my three sons, when we would go camping and sit around the campfire and roast marshmallows.
