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Prize Winners Announced RAM's Wustum Museum Hosts 50th Year of Watercolor Wisconsin

On December 11, 2016, Racine Art Museum's (RAM's) Charles A. Wustum Museum of Fine Arts continued a longstanding Racine tradition with the opening of **Watercolor Wisconsin 2016**. As one of the museum's most popular annual shows, this exhibition brings together the works of artists from throughout the state. Featuring 98 pieces by 75 artists from communities in all corners of Wisconsin, this year's show will be on display until April 22, 2017.

Now in their fiftieth year, Watercolor Wisconsin exhibitions have established RAM's Wustum Museum as a center for watercolor activity in the Midwest. Encouraged to experiment and explore all the possibilities of painting on paper, the artists in the show have created works as diverse as their own imaginations. Online entry has continued to expand the diversity of cities represented.

Of 272 pieces submitted by 155 artists, approximately one-third of the pieces were chosen for this year's show. Three new works from the 2016 competition have been purchased for RAM's permanent collection, adding to the museum's holdings of extraordinary Wisconsin artists.
