Focusing on Renie Breskin Adams' Collection at Wisconsin's Racine Art Museum

Racine, WI June 8, 2017

A celebrated innovator, fiber artist Renie Breskin Adams explores her dreams and personal history through colorful and humorous stitched narratives. Open June 18 – September 24, 2017, *Collection Focus: Renie Breskin Adams* features over 30 works from the last four decades—embroideries as well as some preparatory drawings—that signal the establishment of an archive of over 80 pieces by Adams at RAM.

As a child, Adams would sew, crochet afghans, and make rag dolls. As a student in her twenties, she first studied drawing and painting as a research associate in psychology and education. According to Adams, this is when she really began to appreciate visual arts. A weaving class offered her the opportunity to explore composition and style in a way that drawing and painting did not. From then on, Adams began to blend her abilities in "picture-making" with her inclinations towards fiber and textiles.

With degrees in psychology, anthropology, and visual arts, Renie Breskin Adams brings marked thoughtfulness and sensitivity to what she calls her "embroidered pictures." Whether it is a portrait of her husband, a point-of-view perspective on the sketch pad in her own lap, or a club scene full of human and animal characters, Adams' narratives are simultaneously familiar and alien. Adams explains that her work is "an ongoing subjective commentary, a dignifying of humble events, a revelation of thoughts and dreams, a view of inner realities." She draws on things she has experienced, thought, felt, and imagined—translating them into colorful two-dimensional works that combine embroidery with knotless netting, weaving, crocheting, knotting, and—on occasion—paint or ink.
